What, it is December already ? This year has just flown by and it is time to wish you all a safe, healthy and happy Christmas and New Year. May 2019 bring you many rare DX contacts and perhaps a new radio toy as well.

The highlight of this year's activities has to be the refurbishment of the Crafers repeater site. The tower was in a very poor state and would have fallen down if nothing was done to repair it very soon. A massive effort was launched by Barry, VK5BW and Dean VK5HVM, Lofty Coaches who also share the site with AHARS, and a dedicated band of helpers who got down to the dirty work of cleaning the rust from the tower, repairing its many damaged sections and then applying very special protective coats of paint that will make it last at least another 20 years. Much of this work was carried out over the coldest part of the year, a very big thankyou to all the folks who carried out this work, too many to name.

We had a good mix of topics presented at the general meetings and at the Shack Technical sessions. Thank you to all the folk who did these.

The Social morning on the second Saturday of each month were well attended as was the technical sessions on the fourth Saturday. The social mornings are not just an excuse for a coffee and a chat. At each session, at least one attendee brings along something interesting to show and tell and I am pleased with the depth of technical knowledge there is in the AHARS membership.

Numbers are steadily growing at the second and fourth Friday lunches at the Blackwood RSL. Even though we have to travel from Modbury to Blackwood to attend, Pat and I have become a regular attendee.

Thankyou to the members of the committee for covering for me while Pat and I travelled round Europe for six weeks this year and spent some time in Hong Kong. Gerard, the vice president, was also away for much of this time and the rest of the committee had to take over the executive tasks running the meetings and other activities.

Hong Kong was very different to what it was like twenty seven years ago, the last time we set foot in this part of the world. Many years ago you could buy almost any electronic or radio related item from a vast complex of stores but this has changed and it is difficult to find even one store that knows anything about Ham radio. I found two that advertised they were ham radio stores but they did not stock the connectors and other items I was looking for. I came to the conclusion there was almost no local market for Ham radio equipment and radio parts. Any local who did dabble in Ham Radio construction bought their parts on line like most of us have to do now.

Again this year we seem to have been spared most of the Vandal attacks on the shack and the Girl Guides hall this past year. This being mostly confined to mindless "tag" paint attacks and rubbish strewn round the site. We have a kit of security cameras to discourage these attacks but have not had time to install them as AHARS has been pre occupied with repairing the Crafers repeater site, cleaning up the fire hazards and repairing the second shed.

The ever increasing cost of Australia Post is also making our offering less attractive to Hams all over the world. Thankyou Roy VK5NRG for your effort dealing with the local Post Office and seeing the parcels got off to a good start, on their journey, often to the far flung corners of the earth. We have made the decision not to assemble any more of these kits and once the small stock we have is sold there will be no more. We may will look at other alternatives for future kit sales.

I must thank Christine Southby who gets the supper ready at the general meetings. It is good to be able to have a coffee or a tea, and a cake or a biscuit while chatting with fellow AHARS members and visitors during the interval at these meetings. Christine, VK5CTY, has finally decided to "hang up her pen, put away her keyboard" and give away the task of writing the WIA's Amateur Radio notes after many years of doing this. Advancing years and the occasional ill health has forced this decision so thankyou Christine for many years of service to AHARS.

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

QSL CORNER

Historic QSL cards from Bill VK5HD (SK).

This year, I've been mainly involved with this estate.

Bill lived in Cumberland Park, and his tower is still visible above the rooftops in his street. When I first met Bill, in 1973, he had his own SSTV station, built up from Home Brew gear. He regularly worked his son Trevor (VK5TL(?)) when Trevor was on Macquarie Island (VK9). Bill worked out in the desert with Lloyd Butler (VK5BR) doing mobile radio HF work for the Woomera Rocket Range from around 1955* (These people were genuine pioneers!)

Bill was in the Royal Australian Navy during the Second World War.

During the big cleanup, I found a shoe box of old QSL cards (yes, only one!).

NB: Bill was the brother of Hughie, VK5BC, who operated from near Berri for many years.

There were about 500 cards in the box. I scanned about 30 of them.

All of the cards are now in the hands of Peter Wolfenden, VK5PR, the WIA Historian. **




OH3OE - Tampere, Finland, 1935. Some AHARS members may recognise the name of the city..

I AM A SPINNER

Something a little different!

PAT MALEY

Teacher and ham radio operator

How did you become a spinner? Do you have other fiber hobbies?

I became a spinner when I was teaching in the Textiles Department at Edgecliff College in Cincinnati, Ohio, in the 1960s. I was able to take art classes, one of which was weaving. There were never enough looms, so we also did "off-loom" projects as part of the course. One that I chose was learning to spin. It was during this time that I learned of the Weavers Guild of Greater Cincinnati and joined. At the guild, there were study groups: spinning, lacemaking, rug hooking, backstrap and tablet weaving, kumihimo and ply splitting, and dyeing and surface design. I tried them all. I decided in the 1990s to work on the Handweavers Guild of America's Certificate of Excellence in Handspinning and passed both levels. I began teaching spinning at our guild, at conferences, and at fiber fairs. I also did a lot of demonstrating at pioneer and colonial festivals. Spinning had become my passion.

How did you become a ham radio operator?

"Ham" is the term for a Federal Communications Commission (FCC)-licensed amateur radio operator. My ham name is KD8PAT; it's my call sign. I have volunteered with the Red Cross as a disaster shelter manager for over 30 years. When we had a 100-year flood in 1997, I opened a shelter but had no ham operator. I had no communications with Red Cross. I decided that at the first opportunity I would become a ham. It was something I had wanted to do when I was in Girl Scouts and first heard of hams. I signed up for a license class, and within a year, I had upgraded to Extra, the highest level. I now volunteer not only with the Red Cross but also with our county emergency management agency in the Amateur Radio Emergency Service.

Do your ham radio activities and your fiber/spinning hobbies ever overlap?

Oh, yes! I carry a spindle with me everywhere. I spin at meetings, including those for the radio clubs. It's fun to watch the guys watch me and try to figure out what I am doing. We string a lot of cable in radio work, and my knowledge of twist has been used many times to

keep kinks from forming when uncoiling heavy wire from big spools and stringing it through buildings. One of the weavers in my guild wove towels with Morse code messages woven into the cloth, as they did in WWI. Of course, I had to take one to the radio club. The code hams were fascinated trying to decode the towels. Then they wanted me to weave towels with their call signs. I just wish there was more time in the day for both hobbies. Each fiber has a unique potential that must be discovered to coax out the yarn within. ●
